ADMISSION REGULATIONS

For

B.A./B.Sc./B.Com.(Hons./Genl.)/B.Mus.(Hons./Genl.) Under Choice **Based Credit System(CBCS)**

1. Admission Qualifications:

A candidate who has passed the Higher Secondary (10+2) or its equivalent examination is eligible to seek admission to the First Semester of the Six Semesters B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. (Hons and Genl) or B. A. Music.(Hons. and Genl.) Course of studies provided **he/she has also passed in English having full marks not being less than 100**.

In any case, where there is an ambiguity regarding the admissibility of a particular examination at the Higher Secondary (10+2) level of study, the matter shall be referred to the Equivalence Committee of the University who shall determine the eligibility of the said examination.

However, no candidate, in general, shall be allowed for admission after a lapse of more than 3 years from the year of passing the previous qualifying examination. Those desirous to do so will seek permission from the University Authority.

The year of admission shall not be taken into account while calculating 3 years from the year of passing the previous qualifying examination. For the purpose of determining eligibility for admission to the Honours Course, aggregate marks shall be calculated by adding the marks of **top four subjects in order of marks secured by a candidate**. However, marks in compulsory Environmental Education/Studies shall not be taken into account for calculation of aggregate marks. If the subject "Environmental Science" is studied as an elective subject of 100 marks, it may be taken into account for the purpose of determining the aggregate marks.

<u>Eligibility to Obtain the apply for a Course</u>

For Honours Subject:

Minimum 50% marks in the aggregate and 45% marks in the subject or related subjects at the previous qualifying Examination.

OR

Minimum 55% marks in the subject or related subject at the previous qualifying Examination.

OR

Minimum 50% marks in the aggregate when the candidate has not studied the subject.

▶40% marks in the aggregate or 40% marks in the subject for S.C. / S. T. candidates in all respects.

Candidates Applying for Food & Nutrition (H) must qualify in Chemistry (Theory) in Higher Secondary

For General Subject

Candidates applying for General Course must have pass in each subject & minimum qualifying numbers in Higher Secondary

Candidates willing to take Computer Science as general Subject must have pass computer science in Higher Secondary

2. Mandatory Subject Requirement (at H. S. level) :

A candidate shall be allowed to take up the discipline (s) under heading "**A**" if he/she had passed the subject (s) under heading "**B**" at the previous qualifying examination.

3. Some Special conditions for admission to Honours Courses as follows:

To take up Honours in any subject, the candidate has to pass in that "subject" or "any related subject" in the H.S. examination. In the above table, in general, "subject" and "related subject" are given under the columns A and B. However, the following restrictions supersede the previous clause.

(i) Economics: A) A candidate shall be allowed to take up Honours in Economics if she has passed in Mathematics at the H.S. or its equivalent Examination. However, it is advisable that a student pursuing Honours in

Economics takes Mathematics as a Generic Elective (for pursuing higher studies in the subject in future).

B. A student shall be given B. Sc Honours degree in Economics if she takes up at least one discipline from the Science group for his/her Generic Elective (as given in sec 7b) and shall be awarded B. A Hons degree in Economics if both the disciplines chosen for Generic Electives are from the Arts & Humanities group (as given in sec 7a).

A student will be given B.Sc degree in Economics if he/she earns required number of credits in the structure appropriate for B.ScGeneral and chooses at least one discipline from science group besides economics.

A student will be given B.A. degree in Economics if he/she earns required number of credits in the structure appropriate for B.A. General and chooses the other main discipline (and not the Generic Elective) from Arts & Humanities group, besides economics.

- ii) Education/Sociology: Subjects Psychology, Philosophy, Mathematics, Sociology, Education, Economics, Political Science, History be treated as related subject.
- iii) Philosophy: Subject Psychology is a related subject.
- iv) Food and Nutrition: A candidate shall be allowed to take up Honours in Foodand Nutrition if she has passed in Chemistry at the H.S. Examination and has to take up Chemistry as one of the elective subject.

A student will only be given the B.Sc degree for Food and Nutrition subject. It is mandatory for the student to choose both the subjects from the Science group (as given in sec 7a) to be eligible for the aforesaid degree.

a) Arts & Humanities:

CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

Activities by NSS

Reaching out to Hungry Souls: An Initiative by NSS and Social Outreach Unit of HMM College for Women, Dakshineswar 10th May 2020- What started as a small gesture towards the inmates of Nibedita Colony, has today taken gigantic steps. The NSS and Social Outreach units of HMM College for Women, Dakshineswar have let no stones unturned to feed the needy families inhabiting the large area under Bally Bridge in North 24 pgs. Under the leadership of Principal Dr. Soma Ghosh, Sri Madan Mitra, President GB, and all the team members and the teaching and non teaching staff the college has distributed food grains and other essential items to the inmates of Nibedita Colony in phases, in the wake of the Corona pandemic situation. Helped by the college teachers and donations from other dignitaries in the education field, the college has managed to feed the 70 odd families living under despicable condition in the slum. Since most of the inmates there beg to strive a living, or take part in flying jobs, the Corona pandemic has spelt doom for them. Daily wage earners are facing a tough time to make ends meet. In such conditions, HMMCW has come forward to help. From rice to pulses, puffed rice and potatoes to biscuits, the college has been donating constantly to meet the needs of the hour. The NSS unit of HMMCW has earlier made posters as part of the awareness campaign against the corona virus. The volunteers went to visit the households of the Nidedita Colony slum to raise awareness among the inmates- like washing hands with soap for 20 seconds, keeping the vicinity clean, and wearing masks. Masks were also distributed among the volunteers, teachers and non-teaching staff of the college as part of the awareness campaign. Principal Dr. Soma Ghosh has led from the front in helping these people, supported by her team of NSS and Social Outreach (under the tutelage of Dr. Pranam Dhar, PC, NSS, WBSU), the Department of Zoology under Dr. Indrajit Biswas, as well as Sri Ashim Kumar Sinha. Apart from the internal members, mention can also be made of Smt. Shankari Bhowmick, councillor, ward no. 14, Sri Santanu Palodhi, former Additional Director General, PIB under the ministry of information and Broadcasting who donated 1 quintal rice, 50 kgs of potatoes, 120 packets of biscuits and other miscellaneous items, Ms Mitali Palodhi, nutritionist and national Vice President, of the Indian Dietetic Association Smt. Ibha Bhattacharya, Senior consultant Dietician, Dr. Nibedita Pal, Associate Professor, SNCW and others. The NSS Program officer, Dr. Sujata Mukhopadhya, along with other Program Officers of the state attended 24

central meetings, both at the district as well the State level to apprise the government about the steps taken to combat the corona virus infection.

Hiralal Mazumdar Memorial College for Women, Dakshineswar was cited as a success story in both the district as well the state level of NSS meetings, headed by Dr. Sarita Patel, RD NSS, Dr. Ramaprasad Bhattacharya, JDPI, SNO, NSS,Dr. Basab Choudhury, Honourable Vice Chancellor, WBSU and Dr. Pranam Dhar, PC NSS WBSU. The battle with Corona virus is still going on. The college along with its team is prepared to take on the challenge to feed the hungry souls of Nibedita Colony in more days to come.




